- The EEF guide to Pupil Premium (https://educationendowmentfoundation.org.uk/public/files/Publications/Pupil_Premium_Guidance_iPDF.pdf) highlights that a tiered approach to Pupil Premium spending helps and at St Anne's Catholic Primary School, we have adopted this approach. Effective feedback and intervention from class teachers and support staff is invaluable. We have invested in targeted academic support and prioritise ways to break down non-academic barriers.

Challenges

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Attendance of Pupil Premium Children (PA children) effecting progress and attainment in reading and mathematics
2	Parental Engagement: supporting home learning and understanding what is being taught in school
3	Non participation in: residential/trips/clubs/holiday clubs leading to less social interaction
4	Not having extra support to enable children to achieve through class intervention and before/after school support.
